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## Edible Forest Progress Report

One of the objectives cited when the NPBGS was established was to grow an Arboretum. This summer we are excited to start a unique form of Arboretum we call an “Edible Forest” (see our Fall 2018 Newsletter for a detailed description of the project). The project is partially funded by a grant from the North Dakota Industrial Commission through the Outdoor Heritage Fund.

Bids were recently taken for the two major components:

1. Landscaping: to include grading, seeding, pathway, irrigation, edging, and soil amendments.
2. Fencing and gates that will surround the Edible Forest and the Children’s Garden.

A contract for the landscaping was awarded to S&S Landscaping for the sum of \$31,144.40. A contract for the fencing was awarded to Dakota Fence for \$34,944.00.

By the end of summer 2019 the site landscaping and fencing will be completed with a small portion of the tree and shrub component planted. Completion of the project will occur in 2020 with all trees, shrubs, pollinator gardens, mulch and signage in place. The site will eventually be embellished with resting areas, flower gardens, and art pieces.

Like all gardens, it will take time for the planting to mature, and patience to fully appreciate the intended results. This will be the largest demonstration area for growing fruits and nuts in North Dakota.

In addition to the original Arboretum Committee, a Task Force was created to assist in raising funds to meet matching fund requirements. Also, in keeping with the NPBGS motto to “promote Community through Gardening,” a number of community food partners are involved to promote the project and support involvement in the hands-on site activities. To date, a sum of over \$7,000 has been contributed.


## Garden-related Projects

### West Acres Activities Support the NPBGS

West Acres will continue to support the NPBGS with a new agreement for designing and filling planters inside and outside the Mall. As you visit the Mall, admire the seasonal plant displays.

Also, the NPBGS will continue to assist in operation of the Farmer's Market on the Mall's west side parking lot located on 42<sup>nd</sup> Street. The Market will open late June until the middle of October depending upon weather conditions. Hours will be 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays.

The NPBGS will offer bouquets and herbs for sale on Saturdays, June 29<sup>th</sup>, July 6, 13, 20, 27 and August 3, and 10<sup>th</sup>. To increase exposure for the NPBGS and add interest to the Market, the NPBGS will also provide gardening programs and activities one Saturday a month.

### Get a Head Start in the Garden— Plant Seeds Indoors

Maurie suggested that all you need are a soil mix, containers that drain and seeds. It is best to start most seeds in March to get a head start on the gardening season. As Maurie says, "I just enjoy watching them grow and check them every day; but I think the most rewarding thing is when it comes time to harvest, you go out in the garden and pick a fresh-grown tomato."

We are pleased to announce Lisa Brown as the winner of our 2019 Brochure Cover Photo Contest. Congratulations, Lisa!






### Conversations and Cocoa Jumpstarts the New Year
